APA REFERENCES

This handout provides examples of some citations you might write for your APA References page. For citation formats not included here, refer to the *Publication Manual of the American Psychological Association* (7th edition) or the [APA's website](#). The Writing Center has copies you can come look at or you can find copies at Lied Library under the call number BF76.7 .P83 2020.

Remember that your References page must be double-spaced and include hanging indent. If you need assistance with the layout of your References page, refer to the UNLV Writing Center's handout "APA Formatting in Word" or "APA Formatting in Google Docs."

As a rule of thumb, each References entry contains four elements: the author(s) name(s), publication date, title of the work, and where the work is located—in that order. If you're ever unable to find specific instructions on how to write a References entry, follow this outline to the best of your ability.

Keep in mind that your References page should include entries for each source you referenced in the in-text citations in your paper. Each in-text citation should correspond to a source's entry in the References page (with a few exceptions discussed in our APA In-Text Citations handout).

In <i>Title of resource used in italics</i>. Retrieved Month Day, Year, from URL</p> <p>* When an updated online work does not have past versions archived, use “n.d.” for the year of publication and use a retrieval date. If the work is archived, use that year and omit the retrieval date.</p>

<p>Personal Communications</p> <p>Do not include personal communications in the list of references. However, they must be cited in your paper via in-text citations.</p>	<p>In-text citation: (E. G. Tweitmann, personal communication, February 16, 2021).</p> <p>* Personal communications include emails, personal interviews, text/direct messages, online chats, telephone conversations, live speeches, unrecorded classroom lectures, memos, letters, etc.</p>
